Burlington & Oakville Knights wave the flag in support of Special Olympics Week March 7-13

One of six Special Olympics Flags crossing 113 Ontario Knights of Columbus Districts will arrive in Burlington March 7. The City of Burlington is proclaiming March 7-13, *Special Olympics Week*.

The Flay Relay started Jan. 4 to raise awareness of the Special Olympics and the Provincial Youth Games taking place June 1-3 in Durham Region. Athletes competing at the Special Olympics Provincial Youth Games come from all over the province and earned their way through 52 regional events.

The flag will be in District 67, which includes Burlington and Oakville from March 7 to March 13. There will be a flag raising ceremony at Burlington City hall at 9am on Monday March 7th and at Oakville Town hall at 10:30 a.m. on Friday March 11.

March 7 Burlington City Hall flag-raising ceremony

The City of Burlington will recognize our Special Olympians by having a special flag-raising ceremony with **Mayor Rick Goldring** at City Hall from 9 a.m.-10 a.m. Burlington Knights will also present a cheque to the Special Olympics.

The event will start with a piper led march followed by Special Olympians and Burlington Knights of Columbus Colour Guard from St. Philippe's Church, 472 Locust Street along the sidewalk to City Hall. Everyone is welcome to participate.

March 10 Haber Centre Athletes Night & Flag Transfer Ceremony

Special Olympics Athletes and coaches from Burlington and Oakville will present an Athletes Night and Oakville Flag Transfer Ceremony on March 10 from 7 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. at the Haber Recreation Centre, 3040 Tim Dobbie Drive in Burlington.

Special Olympics Athletes will demonstrate their skills in several athletic categories, including basketball, floor hockey and others. A representative from Burlington and Oakville City Councils are expected to attend to help promote the Special Olympics Organizations.

The flag will be transferred to Oakville during the evening. Its final destination will be the Games in June. Members of the Halton Police and Burlington Firefighters, who are also strong supporters of the Special Olympics movement, will be invited.

March 11 Oakville City Hall flag-raising ceremony

The City of Oakville will recognize their Special Olympians by having a special flag-raising ceremony with **Mayor Rob Burton** at Oakville Town Hall at 10:30 a.m. The ceremony will be followed by refreshments served to participants at the town hall. Everyone is invited to attend.
